One student, a senior and a member of the International Order of the Rainbow for Girls (IORG), stood out for her passion. She creates stunning ball gowns for her fellow members and showcased one of her own designs with pride. Her enthusiasm for both fashion and her organization was truly inspiring.

I also attended the National FFA Organization convention, where I helped judge Floriculture team activities and individual flower arrangements. The teamwork and creativity on display were remarkable. Students supported each other, valued each other's input, and created beautiful arrangements and floral head pieces. I also had the chance to connect with Sparks Florist, learning about their family business and where it originated from.

Finally, at SkillsUSA, I had the opportunity to assist with the Quiz Bowl, a fast-paced Jeopardy-style competition. The students' quick thinking and vast knowledge were astonishing. NEVADA FCCLA EMPOWERS STUDENTS THROUGH LEADERSHIP AND CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Nevada Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) is a Career and Technical Student Organization (CTSO) dedicated to students in Family and Consumer Sciences education. FCCLA provides intra-curricular resources and opportunities that prepare students for careers supporting families, reinforcing its role in career preparation, leadership development, and workforce readiness.

Nevada FCCLA Membership and Career Clusters.

Nevada FCCLA serves over 2,600 members across 30 chapters, supported by 59 dedicated advisers. These mentors help students address various youth concerns, including parenting, family relationships, substance abuse, peer pressure, sustainability, nutrition and fitness, teen violence, and career preparation. The organization focuses on six specific Career Clusters: • Arts and Design • Education and Training • Financial Services • Hospitality and Tourism • Human Services • Public Services

Through these clusters, members cultivate essential skills, including technical expertise, academic knowledge, and careerreadiness abilities, all of which prepare them for success in college, careers, and leadership roles.

State Leadership Conference and Competitive Events

On March 12–13, Nevada FCCLA hosted its annual State Leadership Conference, Dare to Dream, at the Grand Sierra Resort. The event featured general sessions led by the State Executive Council and a keynote address by John Hamilton, Executive Director of the Lead4Change Program. This year's conference saw a record number of participants, with 217 individuals competing in 126 individual events and 30 team events across 30 states and national competitions. The competition results were outstanding: **137 Gold Medals, 219 Silver Medals, and 128 Bronze Medals**

Over 80 competitors qualified to advance to the National Leadership Conference, set for July 3-9 in Orlando, Florida.
